The classes take place during a mother's third trimester of pregnancy.

I update them on the childbirth preparation and parenting classes, the pregnancy tests and ultrasounds performed, the number of women being served, and any new services being offered."

## Study Finds Abortion Pill 22 Times More Dangerous than FDA Claims

According to a study released on April 28, 2025, by the Ethics and Public Policy Center (EPPC), the abortion pill, mifepristone, is 22 times more dangerous than previously claimed in Food and Drug Administration (FDA) data.

In 2023, 63% of abortions in the US were medical rather than surgical abortions. That percentage has grown to 80%. The findings of the EPPC study, along with ease of access to and prevalence of medical abortions, are at odds with the claim that abortion advocates care about women's reproductive health.

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Mifepristone, picture above, was first approved by the FDA as an abortifacient in 2000 and has been used, increasingly more, over the past 25 years.

The EPPC study reports that 10.93% of women experience sepsis, infection, hemorrhaging, or another serious medical event within 45 days of ingesting mifepristone. These results, come from the largest-known study of the abortion pill to date, analyzed data from an all-payer insurance claims database. Analysis considered 865,727 prescribed mifepristone abortions from 2017 to 2023.

An earlier study by the FDA and Danco Laboratories, a pharmaceutical company that markets mifepristone under the brand name Mifeprex, was based on 10 clinical trials comprised of 30,966 participants. That study noted only a 5.26% failure rate among participants.

First approved by the FDA for distribution in 2000, the abortion pill originally was subject to strict regulations. Only physicians could dispense the pills. Its use was limited to the first seven weeks of pregnancy and patients were required to submit to three separate doctor's appointments—the first including a medical exam to ascertain the patient's medical status, the second between the patient's taking mifepristone and misoprostol (the second drug in the abortion regimen), and the third two weeks after the abortion to assess the patient's post-abortion attempt status.

In 2016, the regulations were relaxed, expanding mifepristone's use up to ten weeks of pregnancy. A wider range of healthcare professionals was also allowed to dispense the medication. And the requirement for abortion providers to report complications other than death were removed.

By December of 2021, the FDA no longer required in-person dispensing of the abortion pill. Mifepristone could then be obtained via telemedicine and shipped nationwide.

The loosening of restrictions over time demonstrates an increased and powerful disregard for women's well-being and the assumption that the lives in their wombs are inherently disposable.

The EPPC study's authors, Jamie Bryan Hall and Ryan T. Anderson, conclude that, "[i]n light of this research, we urge the FDA to reinstate earlier, stronger patient safety protocols and reconsider its approval of mifepristone altogether. Women deserve better than the abortion pill."

#### Director's Column: An Update on the Ultrasound Office Expansion

Since our 2024 Strategic Planning Session one year ago, our efforts to expand our marketing, facilities, and services are well underway.


Our partners at Choose Life Marketing are in the final stages of developing a fresh brand for Carolyn's Place and a new sub-brand for our coming client service and ultrasound office. A brand is not merely a logo, but also a cohesive communication design including both the visual elements of fonts and the tonal elements of voice and writing style. It is becoming the norm in modern pregnancy centers to feature a brand specific to an abortion-vulnerable population that is separate from that of the supporter and "happy to carry" populations. The Carolyn's Place re-brand will make its appearance later this summer. Come Fall, we will announce the name chosen for the client intervention and medical service portion of our ministry with its own logo, website, and promotional materials.

Marketing is just one piece of our conversion to a medical-based pregnancy center model. Several weeks ago, we reached a milestone on our facilities expansion by signing a lease for a 1500 square foot office suite directly across the street from our present location. This site maintains our close proximity to two highways, a CT-Transit stop, and offers ample parking. The space still requires some TLC to become a home of ministry. Based on plans developed by Pustola & Associates that we shared in the Spring Newsletter, work will soon begin to convert the presently vacant office space to include a dedicated ultrasound testing suite and several private spaces for clientadvocate conversation.

At the core of any ministry are the ministers themselves. Once operational, the pregnancy testing and diagnostic ultrasound services will function under the supervision and collaboration of Amanda Jones, DNP, APRN, FNP-BC. Amanda is a familiar face at Carolyn's Place, currently leading many of our EWYL classes. We will employ one or two qualified sonographers, highly trained to perform ultrasounds, and plan on including several nurses who will volunteer on some days to assist as a professional resources.

For clients, the essence of Carolyn's Place will remain the same. Women will continue to find us online, through a referral, or by word of mouth, initiating a relationship with one of our client advocates. Pregnancy tests will be performed by medical professionals and many clients will receive an ultrasound to confirm their pregnancy, just as we offer now on the visiting mobile van. Appointments then segue into a conversation about moving forward: strategies for telling parents or partners, parenting education opportunities, adoption, abortion community resources. Since each client's risks, and circumstances are unique, the appointment can expand to another decision conversation with a follow up appointment. Our staff assure that the client feels supported as she makes a plan to move ahead emotionally, physically, and spiritually. Amanda Jones, Several visits to Carolyn's Place are often necessary for the APRN.

In a world where abortion is readily available and accessible, our marketing, facilities, and services expansions intend to increase the availability, accessibility, confidentiality, and longevity of our mission.

#### **Discerning A Commitment to the Mission**

Is God calling you to intentionally give your time to the mission of Carolyn's Place? As we expand our office space and increase our service hours, we are seeking individuals to consider making a volunteer commitment with us. Skills and time commitments vary considerably and volunteers will be asked to participate in a discernment process, agree to a code of conduct, and complete a background check.

**Registered Nurse** - Serves the clients of Carolyn's Place primarily by conducting patient health intakes, administering pregnancy tests, and providing health education. Works under the medical supervision of our collaborating medical provider. **Commitment:** 3x per month on a weekday. Begins late Fall 2025.

**Housekeeping** - Provides a positive client experience by assisting in the interior upkeep of our waiting areas, offices, and restrooms. Tasks include vacuuming, trash removal, mopping, and cleaning of bathroom fixtures. **Commitment**: 1-2x per month. Begins late Summer 2025.

**Prayer Ministry Coordinator** - Coordinates prayer intentions from staff, clients, and supporters of Carolyn's Place to the two prayer groups as well as those on our prayer chain email. **Commitment:** Attends at least one in-person prayer group, monthly. 1-3 hours per month. Begins Summer 2025.

**Hospitality Minister** - Cares for clients and guests through serving on a rotation to provide baked goods for the Tuesday Classes. May optionally share in preparing a home-cooked meal on select Tuesdays for evening classes. **Commitment**: 1x per month. Begins Summer 2025

**Courier -** Transports material aid collections from sponsoring organizations to Carolyn's Place, as well as other destinations. **Commitment**: 1-2x per month, mainly Spring and Fall.

**Bulk Material Organizer** - Physically manages bulk supply of diapers, wipes, car seats, and bedding while providing moving assistance on "graduation day," which occurs every eight weeks. **Commitment**: 1-2x per month.

**Ambassador** - Spreads the word about our mission by promoting Carolyn's Place at local medical offices, churches, schools, or social service centers. **Commitment:** 2-3x per month. Begins Late Fall 2025.

**Newsletter Club** - Meets four times per year to prepare the mailing of Carolyn's Voice for 4,200 recipients while sharing in fellowship around the mission of Carolyn's Place. **Commitment**: One weekday quarterly.

### What's Needed for a Client Visit?

Our wish list and website continue to display materials needed to conduct our life-affirming pregnancy decision visits as well as material support to our graduates. Clients visiting our office are likely having a pregnancy test and/or ultrasound conducted, meaning they will be asked to start drinking water upon arrival. In an attempt to make a soft environment, we make comfort snacks available in one of several meeting areas where a scented candle or fresh flowers ease the environment and tissues stay within reach. Visits conclude with a plan for next steps: printing out pages of referrals or care instructions. Clients take home a copy of the book What to Expect While You're Expecting upon departure.

In between visits, our team assure the meeting and bathroom areas remain clean and welcoming. Utility items on our wish list such as bottled water, Kleenex, or bathroom cleaner play a direct role in our mission to empower women to choose life for their unborn child.
